Subject: Off-Agenda Report: Chronic School Absenteeism in Santa Clara County: Student

Transportation

At the August 17, 2021 Board meeting (Item No. 24), Supervisor Lee requested an off-agenda report related to the feasibility of providing public transportation for elementary, middle, and high school students, as one way to decrease barriers to school attendance. A request was made to identify the number of students needing and receiving transportation services, the type of transportation being provided (contracted, school- operated, public), the number of students not qualifying for transportation and the rationale; student enrollment at the elementary, middle, and high school levels; and the number of housing insecure students. This report responds to the request.

I. Transportation for Students in Elementary, Middle, and High School

The state of California does not require school districts to provide transportation to students who live far from school. School districts determine whether and how to provide transportation to their students. However, there are exceptions. School districts are required to provide students with transportation if they fall into the following categories: students with disabilities, attending federally sanctioned schools, and experiencing homelessness. Funding to pay the cost of transportation is now significantly reduced for all districts. In 2013/2014 the State of California restructured how transportation is funded. Transportation costs were shifted to be funded within the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), and detailed expenditure and ridership data from districts were discontinued. The overall result is that most school districts now have reduced capacity to provide their students with school transportation options.

Because school districts are no longer required to provide detailed data on the numbers of students provided transportation based on qualification or need, these data are not readily available. To collect this type of data from 32 school districts, the Santa Clara County Office of Education (COE) would be required to survey each school district at a time when many are challenged to normalize in-person instruction while balancing COVID safety.

III. The Number of Housing Insecure Students:

The table below provides counts of Santa Clara County students experiencing homelessness for the two most recent school years. The experience of homelessness is defined as students qualifying for McKinney-Vento housing services and supports. (The McKinney-Vento Act is federal legislation that ensures the children's and youth's right to enroll, attend, participate fully, and succeed in school.)² An overall 13 percent decrease in the number of students experiencing homelessness was observed, from 2,896 students in School Year 2019-20 to 2,518 students in School Year 2020-2021.

However, out of 32 school districts, 16 experienced an increase in the number of students experiencing homelessness. Half of the school districts experienced an increase of 1-5 more students with homelessness: Cambrian, Campbell Union, Campbell Union High, Cupertino, Los Gatos Union Elementary, Los Gatos-Saratoga Union High, Mt. Pleasant Elementary, and Mt. View-Los Altos Union. Districts that experienced higher increases in homelessness (range = 6-161) included: Franklin McKinley, Fremont Union High, Gilroy Unified, Los Altos Elementary, Luther Burbank, Morgan Hill Unified, Mt. View Whisman, and COE.
